Pauline's Olympic effort

Pauline Agatha Neita has just finished the 2012 London Marathon, one of the seven charity runs she plans to take part in to celebrate the Olympic year.

Back in 2003, the Messenger reported on local resident Pauline finishing her first charity race, the 5K in Birmingham, at the age of 40. Nine years later, Pauline is still running many charity races with her sisters Kathleen and Annette, including Sport Relief, Race for Life, Sheffield Half Marathon, the Great North Run, Yorkshire Run and the festive Santa Jog.

Pauline's motivation for running comes from her pleasure in taking part. The atmosphere created by supporters, which she describes as 'phenomenal', is enough to keep her running the 26.2 miles to the finish line! 26.2 miles may sound a little daunting and just a time challenge for the super fit, but as Pauline said, "it's all about fun, not finishing first!" She'd encourage anyone to take part in any charity run and as she's demonstrated, you may never turn back.

"If I was at school and the teacher said to me 'would you like to do a marathon'? I would have said 'no'. I'm a sporty



person, but me do a London marathon? I would have been thinking in terms of how far, not thinking how fun it's going to be!"

Once Pauline starts, she aims to finish and did so by running at her own pace, jogging and power walking. There was no intense training either, just a lot of walking and Zumba once a week.

"It keeps me fit and I'm achieving my goal when I complete the race. Once I start I aim to finish"

As part of running the London marathon, there's a compulsory target, which changes according to the charity, however the lowest target can still be a mighty \pounds 1500 which can put people off. But the thrilling atmosphere, the sense of achievement in finishing a marathon and raising a significant amount of money for charity, is well worth all the effort.

Pauline's fundraising came from family, friends, people in the local area and schools. Though she met her target, it was a lot of work. The charity she was running for was Interactive Disability Equality in Sport, which helps disabled people get more involved in sports and enables them to have a more active lifestyle. She's not put off by fundraising though. She'd do it all again but perhaps not every year, as she'd wish to, unless there was a generous sponsor. Pauline would like to thank everyone who has sponsored her over the years.

Police cordon off Burngreave Road after stabbing

Burngreave Road was cordoned off for several hours on Friday 20th April, after a young man was stabbed. The Police told the Messenger,

"Officers are currently investigating a wounding, which occurred around 6.20pm on Friday 20 April 2012 in the Rock Street and Burngreave Road area of Sheffield. As a result, of the incident an 18-year-old man sustained a stab wound to his leg and chest."

Police stated that the young man's injuries were "not believed to be life threatening" and they believe it was a targeted attack. As the Messenger goes to press the police had not made any arrests.

Anyone with any information about the incident or who believes they may have witnessed the incident are urged to contact South Yorkshire Police on 101 quoting incident number 931 of Friday 20 April 2012. Alternatively, people can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Retrial for Spital Hill shooting

Abdi Omar, of Lopham Street, will face a retrial after a jury failed to reach a verdict on his case at Sheffield Crown Court.

Abdi is accused of murdering Deeq Ali in October last year at a party on Spital Hill. The date of the new trial is yet to be announced.

Hucklow praised by OFSTED

Hucklow Primary School received a 'Good' OFSTED rating in March, with 'much that is outstanding' with the teaching.

The report praised the behaviour of the children and the support the school receives from parents, which it describes as 'overwhelming'. It states that pupils feel safe and bullying is almost 'non-existent'. OFSTED were also impressed by the progress children made with their

learning while at Hucklow, stating that "attainment levels are rising, including in reading, and have done so over a sustained period."

OFSTED also said 'the school is well led and managed at all levels'. Headteacher, Susan Arnold, praised the partnership that had led the school to success:

"The reason the school is so successful is because the senior leadership team have focused on making improvements and developed a partnership between parents, children and the school. I am really proud of all the people involved in the school. It's a real joint effort in making our school successful."

Sing Up Gold Award!

Byron Wood have reason to sing they have just been awarded a national award, the Sing Up Gold Award.

Last year the school was awarded its Sing Up silver awards. The Sing Up adjudicator commented on the school's commitment to singing:

"Wow! What a strong application you have submitted for the Gold Sing Up Award and there is no doubt whatsoever that you really deserve to be called a Singing School. Singing seems to be everywhere and part of everything at Byron Wood Primary School! It was good to see so many teachers and staff who are happy to lead and join in with singing in school. I feel that you have so



much to share with other schools and would urge you to consider applying for the Sing Up Platinum Award."

This summer terms sees the school's choir performing at Sheffield Children's Festival, in a massed Sheffield Choir and visiting choir from Cuba. And at the end of term, the Year 5's and 6's will be putting on a production of Hagbane's Doom.

Activity Sheffield staff changes

Burngreave residents went to the Full Council meeting at Sheffield Town Hall on 4th April to tell councillors they valued staff at Verdon Recreation Centre and Pitsmoor Adventure Playground.

Activity Sheffield was changing the staff structure to create higher-paid posts. This means fewer posts for the experienced staff already working there. Staff at both centres – and Highfields Adventure Playground in Sharrow – faced losing their jobs and didn't know what the future held.

Verdon Recreation Centre

Parents and Friends of Pye Bank School brought a petition signed by 510 parents, young people and centre users. Zabeda Hussain, extended services co-ordinator at the school, addressed the councillors to explain Verdon Recreation Centre is an important venue in Burngreave. Aislinn Adams, the development worker, makes the centre accessible to users of all ages. She pointed out it takes years to build up trust with young people in the area. Zabeda called on councillors to confirm if there would be changes to jobs.

Adventure Playground

Lisa Swift spoke on behalf of 149 young people from Pitsmoor Advenutre Playground, who had signed a petition drawn up by 10 and 11 year-olds (Javien Allen, Millie Higgins, Skye Dawson-Hydes and Chanel Dawson). They felt it was not fair the staff were to be replaced with other staff.

Asafa Hussain and Saima Hussain asked questions from the public gallery about why staff were being replaced and why the community had not been consulted.

Councillor Helen Mirfin-Boukouris, the Cabinet member for Business, Growth

and Jobs, stated, "we know how important the centres are to the children, which is why they weren't cut in the Council's budget."

She promised to meet the petitioners, saying, "my job is to make sure the service is provided to the community and the children."

At the meeting, Paul Billington, the Council's Director of Culture and Environment, stated there had been no budget cuts or reductions in the level of staffing overall and that the opening hours at both centres would remain the same. He told parents:

"We're aiming to increase usage at both centres. Verdon Recreation Centre and Pitsmoor Adventure Playground are relatively expensive compared with the number of people using them. The Council is constantly reviewing all its services in the light of reducing budgets. It's important that everything is done to increase footfall at these important sites."

Activity Sheffield has also promised not to put charges up for use of Verdon Recreation Centre. Their focus will be to increase the number of people benefiting from them. They have promised to work with local groups and residents to make this happen.

Meanwhile, some of the staff affected have successfully re-applied for jobs with Activity Sheffield. At the Adventure Playground, one experienced member of staff has gone. Other posts remain unfilled in the new structure.



Fundraising at Verdon Rec

Mothers of Burngreave Network held a successful fundraising event on 13th April at Verdon Recreation Centre.

Children and their mothers attended along with a number of invited guests. Everyone was able to enjoy food, henna, face painting and dancing. All this was provided by volunteers from the group, who raised around £300 on the day. The money will go towards more activities at the Centre, where the members of the group are developing a programme of activities for mothers and their children.

Youth centres affected by changes to youth services

After changes to staff at Sheffield Futures, young people have lost out again at local youth centres.

Two youth club sessions at Verdon Recreation Centre have ended, while other sessions have reduced from three to two hours. All Saints now has 2 evening sessions, Earlmarshal has 4 sessions, and Osgathorpe pavilion just 1. Youth workers are also committed to supporting the Vestry Hall 2 sessions a week.

Sheffield's Youth Services have received cuts of over £5million in the last 2 years. A restructure to create Community Youth Teams, has also meant big changes. Youth workers are now part of a team that includes Youth Prevention workers, Police officers and health workers.

Sheffield Futures have also ended contracts with youth workers who only worked for them for a few hours a week, creating instead jobs of at least 16 hours per week. This has resulted in many youth workers leaving the service and Sheffield Futures have not been able to recruit to all the vacancies available.

Champion Muheeb turns professional

On their arrival at the Messenger office, Elias and Muheeb Fazeldin, father and son, began a revelation of personal achievements, along with their ideology of promoting Burngreave in the arena of professional championship boxing.

Living in the Denholme area of Burngreave and of British Yemeni origin, Elias, a visibly proud father, begins by explaining:

"When Muheeb was 3 years old, we saw him using a skill they called slip-flip, while also using some very strange foot stances when he was play fighting."

Elias was told his son should be taken to boxing lessons but he as a father decided against it.

"I did not like boxing, you see. But it was when we came to live in Sheffield back in 2000, to keep him out of trouble, I took him to a karate club at Concord Sports Centre. He was 8 and did it until he was 13, becoming a brown belt in karate."

Muheeb agreed, smiling while exuding a calm air of confidence.

"My dad liked me doing karate and it helped my hyperactive behaviour," he laughs, "I was always fighting, you see, and getting into trouble. I started hanging out around the back of the Vestry Hall. There I met a local boxer called Richard Towers. He encouraged me, as well as others, to join a local boxing club instead of just hanging around."

With his unique style and skills, Muheeb was quickly noted by both Brendan Ingle and his son Dominic, winning more than 18 of his amateur fights.

"To begin with, I weighed 17 stone and began training it down to



55 kilos, making me a bantam or super Bantam weight," explains Muheeb. "Brendan, Dominic and the other trainers began teaching me how to control my footwork skills before moving me onto the bag and then into the ring."

It was in November 2006, aged 15, that Muheeb fought and won his first amateur fight. As he progressed, his coaches in the Ingle team recognised his very unorthodox style. "They started calling it the Ingle breed," Muheeb says proudly.

Holding the title of Yorkshire region ABA champion for the last 3 years, his trainers are about to propel Muheeb Fazeldin into the limelight. He explains that, now turning professional, he has been regularly sparring with the Ingles' club's top fighters, such as Kel Brooks and Junior Witter.

"I want to be known as a positive role model for my generation here in Sheffield's inner city and my mission is to bring a world championship boxing title right back here, to Burngreave."

From the Streets

Kim Streets, the new Chief Executive of Museums Sheffield, lives in Burngreave. I went to meet her and find out what it's like working in Sheffield's arts and heritage.

"I started twenty-one years ago," Kim explains, "During my time here I've been involved in lots of exciting projects. I had good opportunities and made the most of them, and this post seemed like the next logical step."

Comments from people around the city, and on the Museums Sheffield website following Kim's appointment, show the huge amount of support for her in this new role. One quote stands out:

"There's nobody better for the job or to build on Nick Dodd's achievements. Many of us in Sheffield know how much you have worked out of your role especially as regards Sheffield Castle artifacts. You are a Sheffielder and know what MS and particularly Weston Park means to us." (Ron Clayton)

Times are tough financially, but Kim is confident that Museums Sheffield will weather the massive restructure which will see forty people leaving. "It's very



hard," she states, "because people have really given it their all - it's a labour of love for everyone."

After completing a history degree at Sheffield Hallam University, Kim volunteered at Kelham Island Museum and worked on heritage research at Globe Works. Her first post was Assistant Keeper of Social History - collections of people's stories and items that say something about their lives.

"One of my favourite projects was an exhibition called High Rise. Working with the residents of Park Hill, an artist

called Tim Smith collected their stories and opinions about where they lived."

Kim worked on the book Burngreave Voices which told the stories of many local residents. Living in the heart of the area since 1992, she describes how welcoming it is for newcomers.

"People here are very friendly, and living here gives people from all over the world the freedom to settle and put down new roots. It definitely feels like home. It's also very beautiful - I love the cemetery and parks, and buildings like the old chip shop and the Tollgate house."

Kim enthuses about the excitement of people telling their own stories and how she hopes more Sheffield people will get involved in the museums' collections.

"When the museum first opened in the 1870s there was no other way for Sheffield people to see things from the past or other countries. The collections belong to the people of Sheffield.and the arts give us something to be proud of, an identity".

At the moment, you can see Andy Warhol's late self-portraits at the Graves Gallery, artist Paul Morrison's show at the Millennium Galleries, and an exhibition from the V&A Museum of Childhood called 'Magic Worlds' at Weston Park.

Soap Star in Firvale

A highly motivated 26-year old has broken out of the cycle of temporary contracts and unemployment by setting up his own soap making business, working from home

Nigerian-born Uche-chi Zabdi-el came to the UK with his parents when he was 5 years old. His father was in the Merchant Navy and the family settled in Liverpool where Zabdi-el was educated, obtaining A-levels in Maths and IT. Finding employment at that time was not easy and he had no alternative but to take up temporary contracts in marketing with T K Maxx, first in Liverpool, then in Cardiff. After moving to Page Hall, Sheffield in 2006 he worked in telesales with Voice Marketing.

Zabdi-el told me:

"When this contract came to an end I was unemployed for 6 months. Talking to an advisor at the CAB I mentioned to him that one of my hobbies, from schooldays, was soap-making. He said, 'Why not try setting this up as a self-employed business?' This idea led me to contact a lady in Scotland who had set up a similar business, after redundancy, and was able to give me the help and advice I needed. I order all the materials on line and carry out the process at home. I produce star-shaped, black, transparent tablets of soap which is the unique selling point."

He kindly provided a sample for me to try and it certainly feels good to use. The name of the company is the 'Black Star Soap Co'



and after only a few months, it is already having considerable success in finding new outlets, both on-line and in the retail sector. The 'stars' are available in a range of different fragrances and are advertised as 'anti-wrinkle' and suitable for all skin types.

He hopes that his success will inspire others of his age to launch out in the business world. Zabdi-el says,

"Its repetition that leads to belief, and once that belief becomes a deep conviction, things begin to happen."

In the news 100 years ago


To celebrate the Burngreave Messenger's 100th issue, our local history group decided to look back at Sheffield newspapers published in the same week of May 1912, 100 years ago.

The main papers at that time were The Guardian, The Telegraph and Star and The Sheffield Independent, plus of course The Green 'Un. The Independent, a daily, covered international and national news as well as local happenings which were usually relegated to the latter pages, and included lengthy reports of council meetings in all their boring detail.

Small Adverts

More interesting were the long columns of small adverts. Surprisingly 'long haul' holidays seem popular, cure all remedies, musical instruments, property, lots of goods for sale from various pawnbrokers and as today, sports fixture results galore. One local property advert read:

PETRE STREET (267 – 275), near tram terminus – Four HOUSES; annual rents £85.16s. No 267 has dairy, coal shed, cow sheds etc. bargain for immediate purchaser



Mr J Gregory of 91 Bolsover Road, gains relief with Doan's Backache Kidney Pills

Photographs and cartoons were of course only in black and white and mainly depicted London happenings or the occasional royal birthday or local visit.

Local happenings generally had only small paragraphs tucked in between loftier events as was the following:-

PAUPER SENTENCED
In the Sheffield Police Court, on
Saturday, Edward White, an inmate of
Firvale Workhouse, was charged with
assaulting another inmate, Thomas
Marples. ... White jumped out of bed
and struck Marples violently in the
face two or three times. It was
explained that such occurrencies were
becoming frequent at the workhouse,
and the magistrates.

The Sheffield Independent WOMAN'S KINGDOM a daily fashion page also held 'Wedding Bells' reports such as the following on Thursday 30th May:-

An interesting wedding was solemnised at the Grimesthorpe United Methodist Church, yesterday afternoon, when Mr William H Robinson of Ellesmere Road, Osgathorpe (secretary of the Sheffield Teachers Association) was married to Miss Edith Craddock, eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs Joseph Craddock of Earl Marshal Road. The bride who was given away by her father, wore a frock of cream cashmere de soie and a tulle veil and wreath of orange blossom, and carried a white shower bouquet.



1912 coal strike

In 1912 there were prolonged countrywide coal strikes following cuts to miner's wages. The strikes ended when, despite strong opposition, the government passed the Coal Mines Act, which set a minimum wage for miners.

On Monday 25th March 1912 the Sheffield Telegraph ran an article relating to the strike. Headings were:

GROWING DISTRESS SUFFERING IN SHEFFIELD EAST END RELIEF SUGGESTION SHOULD LORD MAYOR OPEN A FUND?

"The continuation of the coal strike and the consequent closing down of various departments in the large East End works of Sheffield is already causing a great deal of privation among the poorer classes living in the extensive district comprising the Brightside Ward, and there is every indication that within the next few days the distress will be acute. The question of providing relief was discussed at representative meeting called for the purpose by the Rev. L E Day, Councillor Batchelor, and Mr F Mayes at St Cuthbert's Vicarage, Firvale on Saturday."

At the meeting the Rev L E Day mentioned that there was already a small soup kitchen in operation in Owler Lane, and that the Land and Labour Committee of the Sheffield Board of Guardians



had that day decided to put into operation the powers they had to help men outside the workhouse in time of exceptional distress by providing 'distress' work of some sort.

Claude Moore of 276 Pitsmoor Road expressed his concerns in a letter printed in the Telegraph 3rd April 1912, concerning the plight of residents of Princess Street in the Burngreave Ward, which he described as 'a very poor and neglected area'. Mr Moore and his wife appear to have been very public spirited having distributed 'small parcels of provisions (20 one week and 42 the following week) to cases known to us'. He went on to call for a 'civic appeal' and for the 'proceeds to apportioned by some responsible authority according to the necessity of the hour'.

A hundred years later St Cuthbert's Church is still helping those in need. In February 2012 the Burngreave Messenger reported on the Fir Vale Food Bank at St Cuthbert's Church, Firvale.

Whitsuntide 1912

100 years ago Spring Bank Holiday was then known as Whitsuntide, one of the best and brightest of the Bank Holidays. Whitsuntide is a Christian festival which commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Christ's disciples.

Like most bank holidays the weather forecast was not promising but in Sheffield it was hopeful that the rain would hold off for the main event of the weekend on Monday 27th May. This was when children from all over the City marched in processions to the nearest park for the May singing. Whitsuntide, like Christmas, was known as the children's holiday, a tradition started by the Sunday schools in the early 1800's.

It was also a tradition that children had new clothes to wear for the Whitsuntide holiday. For some children in the poorest parts of the City this would be the only occasion when they had anything new. Many children would have hand me downs or second hand clothes.

In Burngreave and Fir Vale there were many wealthy people and they would be shopping for their children's clothes at some of the smartest shops in town. Due to the development of the manufacturing trade, clothes were cheaper and more stylish than they were five years previously.



From the Daily Telegraph May 1912:

A child can be prettily dressed for five or six shillings. The hat may cost 2 shillings and a summer cotton dress 3 or 4 shillings

On the morning of 27th May 1912 children in Burngreave and Firvale would congregate at their local churches. Muriel Hearn who lived at 30 Minna Road would be particularly excited for she was the May Queen for the Burngreave Congregational Church, Pitsmoor Road. Muriel was 16 and she led the church procession to Firth Park. Muriel's sister Dorothy was the May Queen in 1922 and we have a picture of her in all her finery.

Each Church would have its own May Queen who would walk with her attendants behind the church banner, then came the other children dressed in their new best clothes and often carrying garlands of flowers. Adults followed behind the children. Many churches hired a band for the occasion.

The Catholic children in the area assembled at St Catherine's School on



Andover Street. They marched to the City centre where they joined children from all the other Catholic churches. Then they walked to Norfolk Park where the largest crowd of the day assembled.

From the Daily Telegraph May 1912:

Brilliant Roman Catholic Procession

Banners of various hues stretched back as far as the eye could see. Brass bands played marches and between the gaily bedecked cars marched children in all manner of attractive costumes.

The tradition of the May Queen, Whit Singing and new clothes started to decline in the 1970s.

Pitsmoor – A peek into the past

The book covers a variety of interests and areas:



Health day

Pakistan Advice and Community Association hosted two successful health days in May. Many residents from the local community attended to find out about important health information.

Speaking to Chris McCartney, a health improvement worker, she explained how important it was to get the message about cancer to local people. She is currently





focusing on lung, bowel and breast cancer because these are the biggest killers.

"People living in the local area are less likely to go to their doctors with symptoms but the later cancer is found, the harder it is to treat successfully. One

of the messages today is about lung cancer. If people have been coughing for more than 3 weeks, they should go and tell their doctor straight away and get it checked out."

Residents could get information about cancer screening alongside other health checks. Testing was also available for TB and Hepatitis.

Preventing illness is also an important issue and eating healthy food is one of the best ways to do that. Health Trainer Beki Dorely, was preparing fruit smoothies for people to try, so residents could get new ideas about eating five fruit and vegetables a day:

"People really love them; you can make them from frozen fruit, which are easier to keep. Eating 5-a-day can help prevent really serious illness like diabetes, cancer and heart disease, alongside keeping active."

Gulnaz Hussain, from the Pakistan Advice Centre, explained why it was so important to have health days in Fir Vale:

"There are many health inequalities in this area. People are dying younger here than in other parts of the city. We are supporting the local community and many new arrivals to get access to important health checks and the right health information."

Breast cancer awareness

The workshop was very interactive, everyone learnt so much from the session and realised there is so much we still don't know. We watched a film of women's stories and had a nice chat afterwards about misconceptions and old wives tales and got to ask loads of questions.

Learning Somali tradition

Each Saturday Somali girls aged between 7 to 18 years from across Sheffield meet at Verdon Recreation Centre to learn traditional Somali dance.

I met the women who volunteer to teach them dance, sing and play the instruments, passing on their knowledge to the next generation. They told me



"The dancing helps the girls learn and know more about their background and it's a good exercise because they enjoy it a lot and they do not realise they are also exercising. We teach them different variations of dance and different themes, which have different meanings."

The women explained that it is also a time for girls to bond with their mothers because mothers come along with their daughters. It is a good social experience and a chance to speak and learn the Somali language. The girls are now able to perform at weddings, international days and celebrations, such as Eid. The group recently performed at Verdon Recreation Centre to celebrate the end of term, this year focusing on Somaliland colours. At last year's celebrations they wore the blue colours of Somalia.

The Somali Dance sessions are part of the positive activities for young people in Sheffield. They are delivered by the IT-CSSS study support and funded by the Council. Somali Dance Sessions are well attended, both girls and their mothers enjoy attending Somali Dance sessions every Saturday between 1pm to 3pm during term time.





The Past

Formed in 2000, the Friends of Burngreave Chapel and Cemetery keep the building in good condition and support visitors who are looking into their past. Affable chairman Ken Wild says he got involved because he had come to find his family plot. "I found my grandmother - and more of her family I didn't know about," he told me, showing me round the beautiful cemetery on an informal version of his regular tour. The next one is 3rd June - don't miss out!

In the chapel itself is a wonderful display of the history of Pitsmoor.

The Future

The group has become a limited company and aims to get charitable status to allow them to receive funding for vital work such as mending the roof and doors of the right-hand chapel. The left-hand building is regularly used for bike workshops, circus shows and art exhibitions, as well as the Sunday Friends' meetings but the group also wants to bring the second chapel back into public use.

Local artist Patrick Amber said, "at the Interactive Art Festival in March, a girl came with her mum after seeing it advertised in the Messenger. She got involved straight away and made a big, bright daffodil using willow, paper and



paint. She'd never done anything like it before and thoroughly enjoyed it."

We had a lot of responses to our first newsletter promoting the meeting, but the weather was not so good and 22 people attended, including Sheffield Homes and councillor Talib Hussain.

We explained what the TARA had done so far, and how we had spent the Levy money getting the newsletter out, buying things like stationery, providing catering for the meeting and funding the coming trip to Mablethorpe in June. Margaret Hill explained in detail about the budget and the balanced books were there to see. Mohammad Bashe translated in Somali throughout the meeting.



People said they would like more children's activities and, most popular, more trips! Suggestions were Flamingo Land, London, Liverpool and Yorkshire Wildlife Park. They also said they would like us to produce a list of parent and toddler groups and activities, provide courses, bingo sessions and singing sessions especially in Somali and Arabic.

Family pet shot dead in Pitsmoor

A much-loved family pet was cruelly put to death on 5th May 2012 by a shot from an air rifle.

The 14 year-old cat was shot on Saturday, 5th May between 9am and 10.30am by an airgun or pellet gun.

Does any reader of the Burngreave Messenger know who might have been using airguns on that morning? The shooting occurred somewhere in the vicinity of Pitsmoor Road, Roe Lane and Orphanage Road. The cat doesn't wander very far from that area.

Hobbes was always a friendly and trusting cat. The shot passed through the back of his neck and the vets were unable to save his life.

The death of this longstanding family friend was a devastating blow for the family, who were in floods of tears.

The family said:

"If you have any information that may lead to the identity of the culprit, please contact the police on 101 so that no other families in the Burngreave area will face the trauma of suddenly losing a longstanding family friend in such a horrible way."

The police incident number is 738 of 5th May 2012.

BME carers conference

Carers and professionals enjoyed an informative and fun day at the Roshni conference for carers in the BME (Black and Minority Ethnic) community at SADACCA on Saturday 24th April, celebrating 20 years in Sheffield.

Roshni is a local citywide organisation, they offer a variety of services to support women young and old within the South Asian community. Roshni means "light" in Urdu and Hindi

The day's focus was on carers. They offer both emotional and practical help, for both elderly and young people. including trying to overcome the stigma of mental illness.

Dalveer Kaur, BME policy development officer from Carers UK said research has shown that carers in the UK saved the Treasury an estimated £119 billion in

2007, a figure which rises year on year. Mainly due to carers giving 24 hour care seven days a week for a weekly Carer's Allowance of £53, a quarter of a million people juggle work and care, missing out on £750 million in wages.

BME carers often face specific challenges including:

- Stigma, particularly around mental illness and HIV
- Language and literacy, which impedes knowledge of entitlements
- · Lack of culturally appropriate services
- Misconceptions, eg. they all have extended families who will do the caring

Nita Devabhai from the Afiya Trust, spoke about their *Living On The Margins* campaign, highlighting that there has been £3 billion cuts in funding in London alone

Through national conferences and training for carers they aim to achieve a stronger voice for carers

People spoke of their own personal experiences of being a carer.



The three workshops were lively discussions and people had the opportunity to share experiences and information. They were:

- Making self-directed support work for BME carers
- · Hidden carers, how to find them
- BME communities' access to mainstream services

There was an excellent networking lunch and the day proved a very valuable gathering

Fairness in Burngreave

Sheffield's Fairness Commission – which met at Sorby House on 9th May – was set up to look at the harmful impact of the gap between the richest and poorest and to see what can be done in Sheffield.

Its job is to look at inequality in society – how much richer the richest are compared with the poorest. In Burngreave, 40% of households get Housing Benefit but in Fulwood, only 5% do. A lot of academic research shows that looking at this gap tells us more about social deprivation than by just looking at average levels of poverty. It is something that affects wealthy people as well as poorer ones.

These ideas were brought together in a book called "The Spirit Level: Why Equality is Better for Everyone" by two professors – Kate Pickett and Richard Wilkinson.

Professor Wilkinson himself was the main speaker at the Fairness Commission and he showed how the inequality gap relates to poor health, crime levels, life expectancy, illiteracy etc. He suggested the Commission should call for a "living wage" (minimum £7.20 an hour) for the lowest paid and also to publish the pay differences between the highest and lowest paid in organisations. Before the main meeting, he led a discussion hosted by the Sheffield Equality Group, which meets regularly to discuss and campaign on equality issues.

The Dean of Sheffield was the second speaker and spoke of the church's work on poverty. He said that people on low incomes spend an average £1300 extra a year on the goods they buy. He was a controversial choice because of his action against the Occupy movement, which campaigned for action on the very wealthy.

The Commission has to publish its report by September.

Professor Wilkinson called for the meetings to be better publicised because it is a topic that he felt more people should be engaged with.

There will be an open discussion at Sorby House on 12th June (3-5pm) where the topic will be women's issues.

Free home insulation

Sheffield's free insulation scheme, aimed to combat both fuel poverty and climate change, has reached parts of Burngreave.

It offers a package of free loft and cavity wall insulation to private owners and tenants in the city. It was launched in 2009 and recognised that good insulation has a big impact on tackling climate change. Carillion Energy Services is the only contractor the Council is using to install the insulation.

Carillion staff are visiting households to tell occupiers about the scheme. However, if no-one is in and they don't respond to a calling card, they could miss out on the scheme. Carillion are keen to install the insulation but need to make contact with householders first. Social housing tenants are not eligible, as they should have the "Decent Homes" scheme instead.



Mandla Nkosi Sibanda passed away in the early hours of 26th March 2012 having collapsed near his home at Crabtree nature reserve, it is thought from hypothermia, but the exact causes are yet to be determined.

Mandla was born in Lupane, Zimbabwe, and arrived in Sheffield in 1993 with Sunduza Dance theatre, basing himself in the heart of Burngreave.

He will be remembered as musical director for SOSA-XA! Sounds of Southern Africa Choir. As well as leading the group for 12 years, performing regularly at Abbeyfield Festival amongst other events, he also led Kutamba Kids! for several years in Burngreave.

He gave children in over 180 schools a positive image of Africa through workshops in digital arts, dance and a variety of arts projects. He was an oustanding story teller capturing the imagination of children through highly animated performances. In 2011 he helped to lead the Singing for Change project through SEMEA (Southern E-Media Education and Art) which linked communities in Burngreave and Bulawayo. He had just begun to support a new "Dancing for Change" project supported by BBC performing Arts through SEMEA.

Mandla believed in bringing communities of all faiths and backgrounds together. He did this through a natural charismatic personality, by modestly sharing his talents and bringing great joy and energy to everyone with whom he worked. He leaves behind a wife and four young children and he will be sadly missed by all who had contact with him.

Mohammed Yousaf 1941-2012


Born in a village on the outskirts of Peshawar, Pakistan, Mohammed Yousaf lost his dad at the age of 4 and he was brought up by his elder brother.

Mohammed was educated to the 10th standard (equivalent to GCSE) in English, which was quite rare at the time. At the age of 20 he got the opportunity to come to England and work in the steel industry, working for 10 years at Forgemasters in Attercliffe. He lived on Baltic Road, before moving to Goddard Hall Road in the 1970s, and then to Abbeyfield Road in 1997.

As he was educated and spoke English he became a forklift truck driver. He was made redundant in 1971, as the steel factories began to outsource work. With his English and driving skills, he was able to pass his taxi test in 1971, driving a black cab until 2001 before driving a private hire cab until 2011, with City cabs.

Mohammed had a difficult time, like many people from an Asian background, settling into Britain. He wasn't accepted at first, but his English helped him make many friends in the area.

He was diagnosed with stage 4 lung cancer on 10th May 2011, before that he



had been completely healthy, regularly exercising at the Hilton Hotel gym. He had a cough for many years, which he thought was due to smoking, but after feeling pains in his chest he insisted that the doctors look into it further, and they found advanced cancer. He had radiotherapy and chemotherapy, at Weston Park Clinic, which reduced the tumour. In March he was readmitted to Northern General and diagnosed with a brain cancer. Many of the nurses who treated him at Northern General recognised him, because he had picked them up from work in his cab. Passing on the 2nd April at 7.45pm, he was surrounded by all his loved ones. He is now resting at Southey Green Cemetery.

He was such a cheerful, joyous, charismatic person that he lightened the place up, and that's why so many people still remember him and miss him.

He left a wife, brother, nine children and many grandchildren who miss him dearly. May he rest in peace.
